
Furness Beekeepers Spring Convention

Four Carlisle members recently attended a disease awareness and recognition day at Keswick. This will no doubt be very beneficial to members especially at our April meeting of Disease Identification.

It has become absolutely imperative to check hives for varroa mites. Resistance to Bayvarol etc is endemic in Cumbria. Up to 50% hive losses have been reported in parts of the county. **To do nothing is not an option.** To rely on strips is not an option anymore. We must all keep on top of the little red varmint to keep our bees healthy.

This is the time of year when hives can be short of food, as laying increases. We owe it to our bees to keep them fed.

We all look forward to a much better summer than last year, don't we!
