June in the Apiary

I have just read in the BBKA News "With warm weather in June the bees will be hard at work". Well, certainly not this week! As I write, it is cold and wet, with a forecast very much the same for the next week. How different this is to last year when we had scorching temperatures and very little rain, although up to now this year has been comparatively dry. It is very difficult to plan anything that relies on the weather and at times like this the bees need all the help we can give them.

One way is to make our gardens bee friendly by growing flowers that will attract bees and other beneficial insects. It is something that I have done for many years and it is surprising the variety of insects that can be attracted to the urban garden.

In regard to this I was particularly grateful to Margaret Riches, of Penrith Beekeepers, for sending me the following article that she had read in the Telegraph.

The Bumblebee Conservation Trust has upgraded its Bee Kind tool so that gardeners can assess their plants and receive recommendations on ways to raise their garden's bee-friendly score.

The free app assesses the latest scientific findings and gives plants a Bee Kind score, depending on which plants work best for the insects. It also contains a wide range of new features allowing users to personalise the planting advice they receive.

The Bee Kind plant information will be continually updated as more scientific data becomes available.

The Trust says the tool is suitable for schools, businesses, local authorities and the public to improve gardens and green spaces for bee and other insects.

In our garden we have a number of species of solitary bees nesting in various places, including, I suspect, under the floor boards, having gained access through a ventilation brick! This picture is of one of the culprits on

the cotoneaster



and is one of the many Mining Bees. I am reluctant to say which one as there are a few that look similar to each other.

Cotoneaster is an excellent shrub for attracting bees, of all types. The flowers are extremely small but during early June they are covered in bees and during the winter there is an abundance of red berries which the Blackbirds love and during very cold snaps we have had Fieldfares taking there share.
