I started the last issue of the Bee Times talking about the weather and I find myself at it again! There have been very hot days and extremely wet ones. To be a beekeeper I have always thought that you need to be optimistic and the thought "It can only get better" is often at the forefront of my mind. Carlisle Beekeepers must have thought this at the end of the Dalston Show on Saturday 10th August, when they braved the most appalling weather conditions with 2 inches of rain during the day, flooded roads, ankle deep mud and hardly anybody attending the show. However, they stuck it out until the end of the day enthusiastically informing the public (the few that attended) about bees with a very nice display of honey tasting, candle making and an observation hive.

The following Saturday, the 17th August, Whitehaven Beekeepers had their Annual Honey Show at the Gosforth Agricultural Show. The difference in weather was amazing! The day before there had been about 3 inches of rain but on the Saturday there was plenty of sunshine and a drying wind that prevented the mud of

previous years. Their display of bee produce and skep making, encouraged a lot of interest from visitors to the show and promoted beekeeping in a positive and informative way. The honey show was very well supported with a good number of entries in all classes.

Wasps, although they are a gardeners friend during spring and early summer catching aphids and caterpillars to feed to their brood, by the end of July they can become a major pest, especially to beekeepers. This year they seem to have been more abundant than ever in some apiaries and by the time this issue of the Bee Times has been circulated it may be too late for preventative action against them. However, it is useful to be prepared for next season and the following article, supplied by John Harris, is an extract from the Thorne Beekeepers News, written by John Stevens of Cirencester Beekeepers, the inventor of Wasp Out.

Wasp Out was developed over two seasons and has proved invaluable on our apiaries around Cirencester. Whilst seeming to frustrate the wasps at first it is important to place a jam pot with a jam and water mix on each hive. I drill a 7mm hole in the centre of the lid with a number of 3mm holes around the edge. Use the cheapest jam you can find, I use Aldi at 28p and mix with three parts water. I found an old Ambrosia jerry can useful.

Our traps are filling up within 5 days at the moment. We also have Thornes Asian Hornet traps on each site. Fortunately no Asian Hornets but a few European ones, moths, flies and wasps have been caught. If you have a large colony going into winter you may find the bees not able to remove the dead bees easily. This was pointed out by a local beekeeper who experienced the issue, although it may have nothing to do with the Wasp Out.

Next season we hope to offer a Wasp Out for Nucs, with different openings to accommodate a variety of makes.
